Q&A with Patti

Member profile



1. When & why did you join Toastmasters?

Initially in the early 1980s to gain presentation skills to assist with my career. I was a TAFE teacher and Gary and I also developed computer systems for small businesses. Having gained skills I needed at the time I left the organization. When we came to Bribie in 2006 we saw the ad for Islander Communicators and it sounded like just what we wanted. We were looking to associate with people interested in growth and wanted to improve our presentation skills. We initially joined Bribie Toastmasters but switched to Islander due to clash with our dancing lessons.

2. What have you gained from being a Toastmaster?

Besides fun and friendship and a few pounds in weight (I notice that Toastmasters eat well and I enjoy food), I have gained confidence in speaking before a group. I also have better appreciation of the structure of a good speech. Recently I have gained appreciation of the leadership opportunities that Toastmaster brings and wish to pursue this more.

3. What club/district roles have you held?

Islander VPPR for about 18 months. I was involved in a major project last year at work so I had to stand aside.

4. How do you use your Toastmasters skills outside of the club?

I use leadership skills at work. I also represented Toastmasters locally as a judge at a Lions youth speaking contest and have spoken to community groups.

5. What are your hobbies?

Dancing, solving puzzles which can be killer Sudoku puzzles with Gary, or an IT problem for work, walking, moderate bike riding, family and friends, being grateful (fits into life skills). I have spent a lot of time studying this area, including a Masters of NLP in Las Vegas in 2007. In future, I would love to be able to really communicate some of these skills and do professional presentations.

6. What do you do for work?

I'm an Oracle database specialist. I administer large databases (upgrade, backup, recovery, tuning, design) and also develop back-end programs eg calculating broker commissions. I work remotely for a Melbourne-based consulting/outsourcing company. We also have a holiday house which we self manage.

7. How long have you lived on the Coast?

We built our holiday house on Bribie Island in 2001 and moved to the Island full time 5½ years ago. Gary grew up in Nambour and we have been visiting Bribie for more than 20 years. I think it was fate, as I fell in love with Nambour when passing through in the 60s (I was 14) and

named one of my horses Nambour. I also had a childhood fancy about a town called Banana - in the 80s I was thrilled to visit friends of Gary's on a cattle property in Banana!

8. Which is your current home club?

It was Islander, but for work reasons I cannot currently make Monday morning meetings with any regularity. So Mercury Motivators will be my home club next year.

9. What are your next goals?

To reach Competent Leader. Support Gary if he becomes District Governor and even if he doesn't! I have nominated as Area 3 Governor next year. (Yes, it was a surprise to me, too). If accepted, my goal is to lever Gary's experience for the role and continue the great work he has done this year. I am very proud of Gary – I think I'm still in love!

10. Why did you join Mercury's?

I enjoy the interesting meetings and associating with a great bunch of people. Mercury has weekend meetings that I can make. I like doing things differently. I enjoy the challenge of meeting and speaking in different venues.

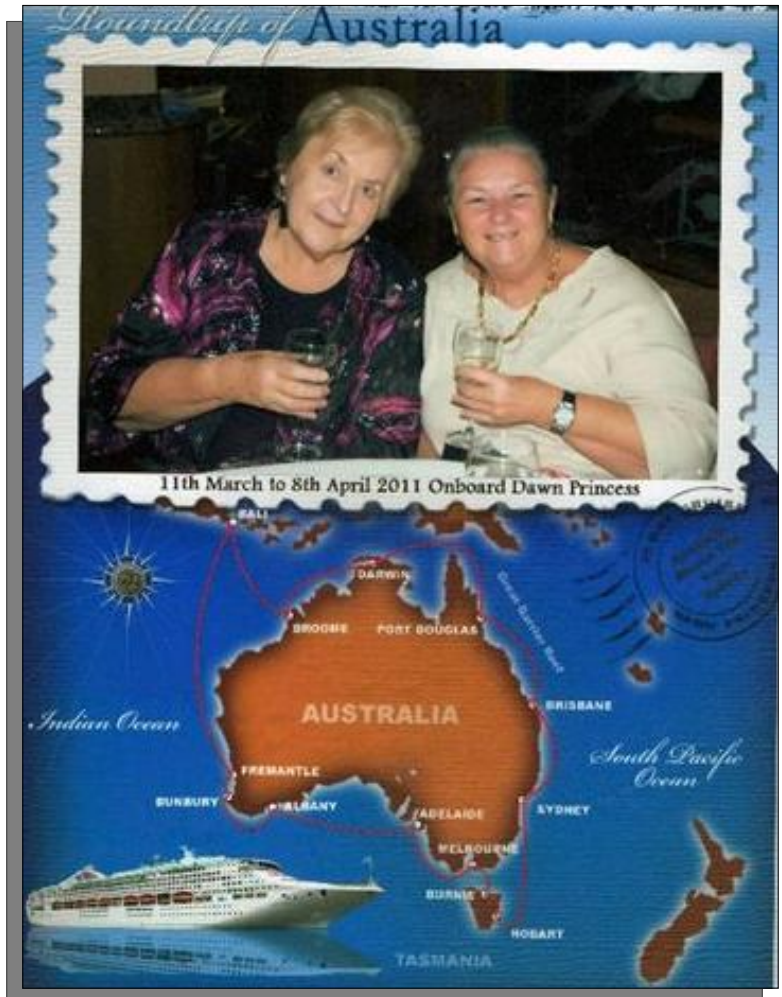
"The waiters sang Happy Birthday and brought me a small chocolate cake, so that was very special."

"An advanced Toastmasters club must be just as comfortable for me."

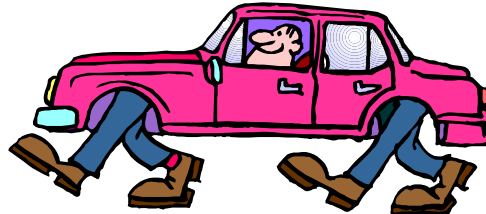
Barbara's impromptu presentation followed Gary's official Area Governor address to Mercury's members.
