Special course to showcase uni programs

During May and June some students taking part in Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) asked USC Speakers for help in preparing for the National Championship in Sydney.

We spoke with their President Amy Jones and put together a 12-hour, three-session course where the students had to showcase the programs they were running at the University of the Sunshine Coast.

We focused on what they needed for the contest - preparing a speech and answering questions from the judges who ask about the students' programs.

As a result we used lots of impromptu activities - table topics, games, word-at-a-time, fortunately/unfortunately, round robins, role plays and using a microphone.

We had a ball! John and Fran Kay helped at two of the sessions and other USC Speakers members made up the team to run the special course.

I went with them to USQ for a workshop and we also attended two rehearsals just before they left for Sydney. They didn't win, but got really high marks for their presentation, and answered the judges' questions confidently. They are keen to enter again next year.

We asked one of the SIFE students to give the Demonstration Icebreaker speech at session one of our Speechcraft course - she was delighted to be asked and made a great speech.

The first session went well, and all Speechcrafters are looking forward to gaining confidence during the course.

Students gain confidence

The five-week Speechcraft course is run at the start of each semester to assist students to gain the confidence and skills they need when making presentations during their university courses.

Many students tell us doing Speechcraft has made a huge difference to their grades; it has saved them failing

a course because they were too terrified to present the work they knew, but were unable to communicate in front of their class.

It is essential that the course is held during the first five weeks of semester, as after that time there are too many assignments and the work level makes preparing speeches and attending a course extremely difficult.

We generally ask students who have done the previous course to help run the following one, as it further enhances their confidence, and allows them to work in their Competent Communication and Competent Leadership manuals.

All Speechcrafters choose a Toastmaster to be their mentor during the course.
